His Hon Judge David Harvey, Auckland District Court

Judge Harvey was appointed a District Court Judge in 1989. He has been closely involved with Information Technology initiatives involving the Judiciary including the development of trial management software. In addition to his Judicial duties, Judge Harvey is consultant editor for Butterworths Electronic Business and Technology Law and a member of the Editorial Board for Butterworths Technology Law Forum.
